The relevance of the research topic: is due to the need to study modifiers and determinants as a single class of service words in the nominal group of the English language. In this final qualifying work, data on the transformation of units of various lexical and grammatical categories into groups of modifiers are systematized, the approaches of foreign and domestic scientists to the study of determinants are considered in detail, and the order of determinatives and modifiers in the English nominal group is determined.

Goals. The main goal of the final qualification work is a comprehensive description of the transformation of units of various lexical and grammatical categories into groups of modifiers, as well as an analysis of the characteristics of the qualification of particles in modern domestic and foreign linguistics.

Tasks: In order to accomplish this goal the following tasks should be worked out:

- give a full description of the concept of “definiteness effect” in the English language;
- consider and study the structure of existential sentences;

- consider and study the structure of possessive sentences;
- identify and describe the functioning of the quantifier every in an existential construction using the example of the British National Corpus (BNC);
- identify and describe the operation of the quantifier every in a possessive sentences using the example of the British National Corpus (BNC);
- identify and describe the functioning of the quantifier all in an existential sentences using the example of the British National Corpus (BNC);
- identify and describe the functioning of the quantifier all in a possessive sentences using the example of the British National Corpus (BNC).

The theoretical and practical significance This graduation work makes a significant contribution to the systematization of existing knowledge about determinants, as a unified classification of service words with a cognitively organized structure, performing the function of semantic operators.

Results: Due to the analysis in this work, the data on the transformation of units of various lexical and grammatical categories into groups of modifiers were systematized, the approaches of foreign and domestic scientists to the study of determinants were considered in detail, and the order of determinatives and modifiers in the English nominal group was determined.

As units belonging to the communicative category, we found that modifiers fix the relationship between the speaker and the listener. The implementation of these relations is related to the expressive function in a narrow sense. Modern linguistics defines several types of determinatives in English: definite article, indefinite article, demonstrative pronouns, possessive adjectives, quantifiers, numerals, distributions, and pre-determinatives.

Regarding the order of determinants and modifiers in the English name group, it was found that in English, the modifier always follows the determinative, which is determined by the linear direction in the categorization of human thinking, that is, first to designate an object, then to describe other more detailed characteristics of this object. In constructions where modifiers are placed after the Central determinative and pre-determinative, the limits of the areas of

determination and modification are strictly observed. After passing the boundary of the Central determinative, deviations are possible due to the determinative nature of certain adjectives and the adjectival nature of the post-determinatives themselves.

Tips for implementation: The results of this work can be applied in the educational process in classes on theoretical and practical grammar of the English language, in the course of General linguistics and practical English, when writing scientific papers: scientific articles, term papers, theses, master's theses.
